FEMALE INVENTOR -MARY WALTON

- Mary Walton was born in New York City in 1827. There is little information on Mary's life, she was not well-known at the time. However, a statement made in 1884 and published in the Lexington Weekly Transcript provides some important details regarding her youth. Her father raised and taught her because he didn't have any sons and believed in educating his daughters.
- She was a 19th-century American inventor who created pollution-reduction
 innovations. Mary's first invention was a chimney and locomotives system. Her
 mechanism diverted emissions from industry smokestacks into water tanks, where the
 pollutants were collected and eventually discharged into sewers or other appropriate
 channels.
- This invention was an excellent starting step toward reducing pollution. Mary later
 developed a technique to lessen noise pollution. The rapidly expanding train
 infrastructure in New York City was a source of noise. Mary recognized a solution and
 devised a mechanism in which she used a wooden box lined with cotton and filled with
 sand to solve the problem. The train's noise level was decreased as a result.





PROGRESSIVE ACTIVIST – IDA TARBELL






- Ida Tarbell, whose full name was Ida Minerva Tarbell, was an American author, lecturer, and industrial historian best known for her classic The History of the Standard Oil Company. She was born in Erie County, Pennsylvania, on November 5, 1857, and died in Connecticut on January 6, 1944.
- She was one of a group of so-called "muckrakers" who helped shape investigative journalism. Ida Tarbell was a progressive activist.
 Despite not being a proponent of women's causes or rights, she worked in a masculine environment of journalism, financial analysis, and foreign affairs.
- Tarbell succeeded in a male world as the most prominent woman participating in the muckraking movement and one of the most respected business historians of her generation.







Elevated Railway noise pollution reduction system
