




Personification

• **Definition:** Personification is a literary device in which human characteristics are attributed to non-human things. It is a metaphor in which objects, animals, or abstract ideas are given human qualities or abilities.



Examples of Personification





Example 1: "The wind whispered through the trees."




Example 2: "The stars danced playfully in the moonlit sky."



Example 3: "The flowers nodded their heads in agreement."

Analyzing Personification

- Identify Personified Objects: Look for nonhuman subjects given human qualities or actions.
- Understand Context: Consider the overall meaning of the personification in the text.
 What does it add to the description or narrative?
- Effect on the Reader: Consider how personification enhances the reader's understanding or emotional response.



Using Personification in Poetry

Enhancing

Enhancing Imagery: Personification brings inanimate objects to life, making them more vivid and engaging for the reader.

Creating

Creating Atmosphere: By attributing human characteristics to non-human elements, poets can create a specific mood or atmosphere within their poems.

Emphasizing

Emphasizing Themes: Personification can emphasize themes and ideas by giving them human form, making them more relatable and understandable.
