

Unit 5 Project – Civil War and Reconstruction

Below are the instructions for your Unit 5 Project along with a list of guidelines detailing how to earn a solid grade for your work.

Instructions

Your Unit Project will be a demonstration of several different perspectives of citizens in the United States during the Civil War in the form of a report *or* a series of journal entries.

Review the Unit Project Lesson for step-by-step instructions.

Your Unit Project must have a minimum of 300 words and include the following:

- An introduction identifying the three perspectives you will share in your report/journal entries
- Three separate paragraphs demonstrating the perspectives of the following:
 1. A US citizen living in either a border state *or* the American West
 2. A woman *or* African American involved in the Civil War
 3. A citizen of the Southern states after the Civil War
 - You must include at least four of the major events for each perspective
- A conclusion that explains why these perspectives are important today to understand and remember.

Remember to write in complete sentences in your own words and use good spelling and grammar.
