The rubric provides a consistent framework for evaluating student work throughout the semester, including essays, presentations, document analyses, and research projects. It establishes clear expectations for historical thinking, analysis, and evidence-based argumentation, guiding students in their development of critical inquiry, interpretation of sources, and communication of historical understanding. Each submission will be assessed based on historical accuracy, clarity of argument, use of primary and secondary sources, and coherence of organization. Key areas of focus include thesis development, contextual analysis, evidence integration, and interpretation of significance. Proper citation of sources, when required, and the overall quality and effort demonstrated will also be considered. This rubric ensures fair, transparent assessment while promoting student growth in historical reasoning, analytical writing, and informed civic awareness.
