This rubric provides a consistent framework for evaluating student projects for Unit 2, ensuring fairness and clarity in assessment. It establishes clear expectations for creativity, historical understanding, and effective communication, guiding students in applying their knowledge of past civilizations to design an original, well-developed empire. Each project will be assessed on historical accuracy, creativity, and the thoughtful integration of characteristics from at least six civilizations studied in this unit. The rubric emphasizes the student's ability to explain and justify their choices, demonstrating both historical knowledge and critical thinking. Students will be evaluated on their **historical understanding**, shown through accuracy in describing and adapting cultural, political, economic, military, and social characteristics from chosen civilizations; their **creative application**, reflected in the originality and depth of their new empire design; and the **quality of presentation**, including clear organization, logical flow, visually appealing slides, and consistent formatting. In addition, projects will be assessed for **analytical explanation**, with each characteristic supported by clear reasoning, historical background, and a discussion of its potential benefit to the new empire, as well as **use of evidence and sources**, with appropriate reference to historical examples, accurate details, and proper citations when applicable. Proper credit must be given for any outside materials, and plagiarism will not be tolerated. This rubric is designed to promote historical reasoning, encourage innovative thinking, and strengthen students' ability to connect past civilizations to creative, evidence-based projects.
