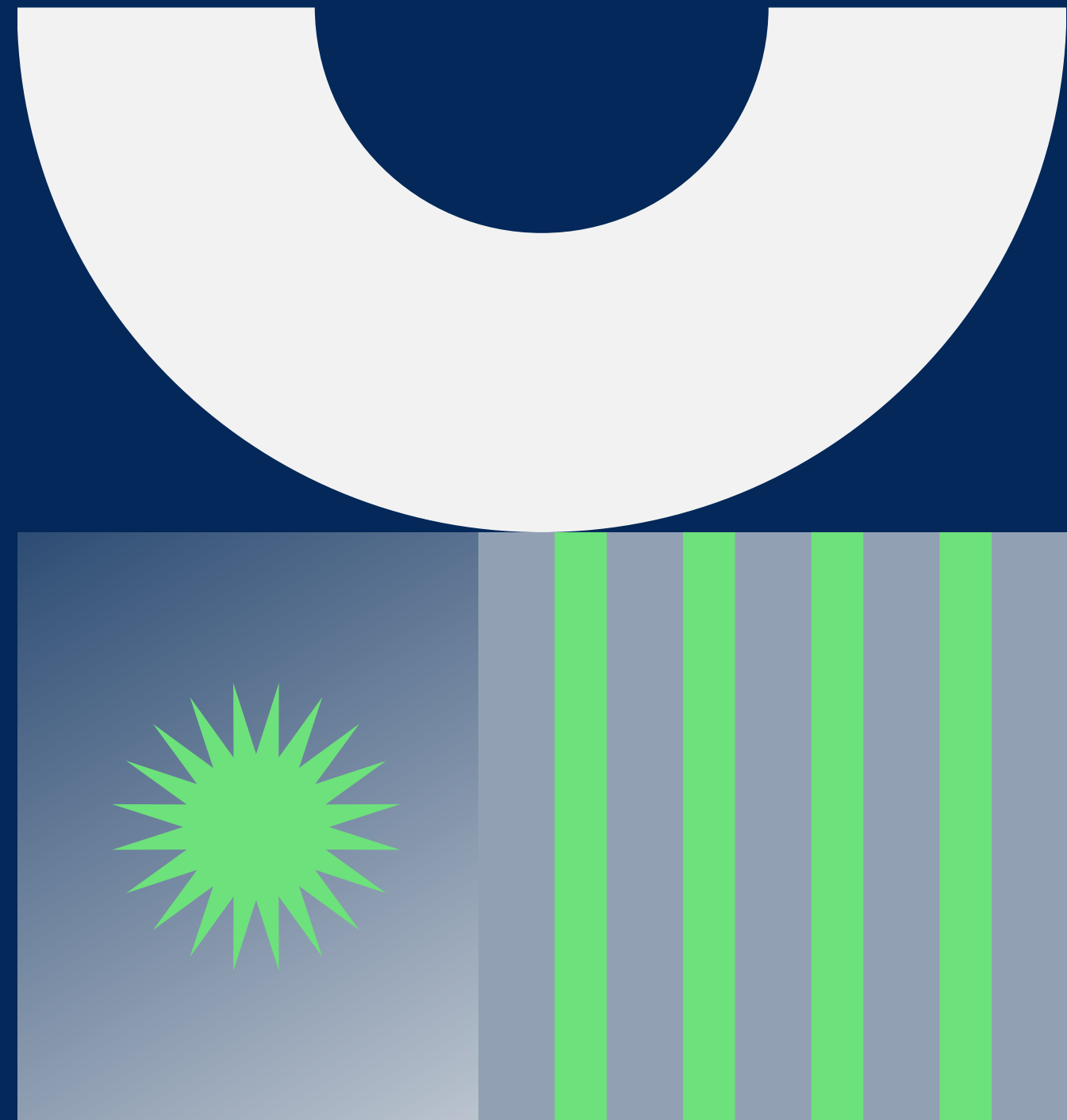

The **conclusion** summarizes and reinforces the importance of the process.





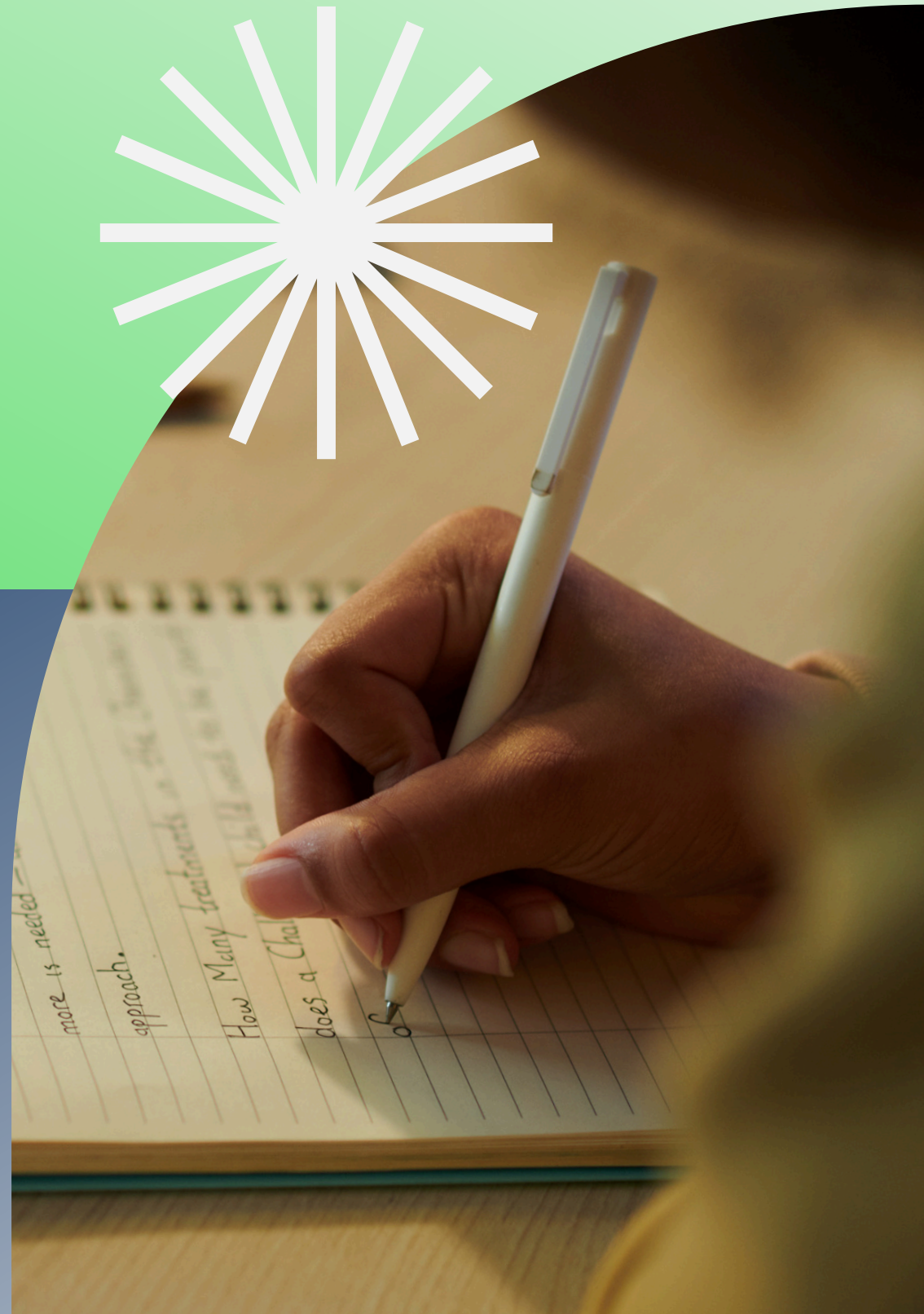
